

<p>08:00</p>	<p>Show Video – Every Home Needs Working Smoke Alarms -- then review</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Discuss dangers of smoke and gases when fire happens • Discuss how alarms notify when there's danger of smoke and fire • Note the importance of leaving the home when they sound 	<p><i>alarm increase my chances of surviving a fire?</i></p> <p><i>Working smoke alarms will alert occupants of smoke – early detection will increase escape time</i></p>
<p>12:00</p>	<p>Show Video – Where Should You Place Smoke Alarms in the Home – then review:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Discuss that smoke alarms are needed in every home • Share info that alarms are needed on each level, even in the basement • Note importance of alarms inside and outside all sleeping areas • Place alarms on ceiling or high on wall • Share information about avoiding placement near kitchens and bathrooms • Write the date found on back of alarm 	<p><i>Note that alarms may be wired in a sequence or that they may be wireless interconnected devices</i></p> <p><i>Alarms are needed anywhere people sleep – not just in bedrooms</i></p> <p><i>It is important to know when the alarm was made.</i></p>
<p>19:00</p>	<p>Show Video – Smoke Alarm Maintenance – then:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Review kinds of alarms <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Battery Operated ○ Electric with battery backup ○ Interconnected ○ Sealed batteries ○ Replace alarms ten years old or older • Describe how to test all alarms once a month <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Listen for three beeps in a row ○ Replace alarms or batteries (depending on sealed or replaceable) when the three-beep pattern isn't heard 	<p><i>Be sure to indicate differences between sealed battery devices and replaceable batteries</i></p> <p><i>Where should smoke alarms be placed?</i></p> <p><i>Explain how to properly test a smoke alarm.</i></p>
<p>30:00</p>	<p>Application/Evaluation:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Ask students to share what conditions smoke alarms help to avoid when there's a fire. • Have students describe where they can or have placed smoke alarms in their own homes. • Pass smoke alarms around the classroom and ask students to identify the location of the manufacture date. • Ask students how often alarms should be tested. • Ask students to share how often a smoke alarm should be replaced. 	<p><i>Use overhead questions and allow students to share their knowledge or feelings about smoke, fire and smoke alarms.</i></p>
